The Diocesan Annual Catholic Appeal

At the beginning of Lent, we began the Diocesan Annual Catholic Appeal (ACA) for 2008. This collection, taken up throughout all 99 Parishes of the Diocese, is seeking to raise, as in past recent years, \$2.5 million.

All Parish Households received a "love letter" from me along with a pledge/gift envelope. In the event you have lost your envelope, more are available at the Parish Office and at the Information Table on the Plaza after all Masses.

The \$2.5 million contributed by all the Parishes of the Diocese supports the mission of our local church, the Church of San Diego, through "Education in the Faith," "Priestly Ministry," and "Catholic Charities."

In support of the ACA, the Church of St. Thomas More will contribute \$34,000 as its fair share for 2008. As a benefit to our Parish, the Diocese will return to us all funds collected over and above our goal amount.

This year, as last year, funds received over our goal amount will be directed to the Operational Budget. Last year, \$17,000 was returned to the Parish for our ongoing needs.

MAKING ROOM IN THE PEW

I'm short. I aim for the aisle seat at the movies so I can lean out and see. If I'm seated in the middle of the row, it's certain some tall person (anyone over 5' 3") will sit in front of me, obscuring the view.

In church, I'm a front-pew parishioner. I want to see the chalice raised and the bread broken. If I'm not in front, Mass is a sea of backs and necks and hats and hairdos. I will leave knowing where he keeps his Skoal tin and where her dyed hair ends and the naturally colored growth begins. But what's happening on the altar? The lector could cha-cha to the ambo and I'd have to hear about it later.

My children resist the front pew. During his teen years, our oldest began calling us "the publican family" He liked that Gospel about the publican whose piety was always loud and, well, front-row.

Abram was at his best those not infrequent Sundays when we squabbled at home and in the car and through the parking lot, only stopping at the church door. It was not peace; it was a cease-fire. The hostilities would resume on the way home, with a few forays—the wrist wrench during the sign of peace, the underhanded pinch during the liturgy of the Word—across enemy lines during Mass.

On those Sundays, we walked in smiling, greeting other parishioners and giving the

obligatory, "Fine, thanks," to questions regarding our health and well-being. Abram would follow, his head down, muttering, "The publican family goes to Mass."

Now, with my 89-year-old mother living with us, we choose the front pews still. My mother can see and hear better there, and she's only feet from the Communion ministers who come to her, bringing with them the bread of life and the cup of salvation.

Then, there's the two of our grandchildren in town, she a restless 2 and he a wandering 4. They behave better if they can watch the movement and hear the whispered commentary of a parent or grandparent. "Look, Anna, she's saying, 'Thanks be to God' with her hands. No words at all." The signers fascinate them, and the children can now exclaim "Alleluia" with the hearing and the deaf of our parish.

Of course, it's hard for our daughter and her husband to get the four of them to church on time. We often lay down our coats on the pew, the sign for saved seats.

So, you can see, I have a lot of good reasons for sitting in my pew. I didn't pay a pew fee, of course, and would never advocate bringing such a system back. I have squatter's rights, the nine-tenths of the law that is possession. I've been sitting there for a long time. Just ask anyone at the 8:45 Mass. They can tell you where the Nussbaums sit.

A new family has joined our parish. They have young children. They like our pew, too. Perhaps they also want to watch the Gospel book raised. Perhaps their children, like ours, behave better when they observe the processions in and out and the bowing down and the liftings high.

The first time I saw the new family in our pew, I felt a twinge of irritation. But, publican that I am, I smiled and greeted them as I slid into another row. It was the next Sunday when I understood how inhospitable my habit had become. I walked into church to see this family as they prepared to take their seats. A longtime parishioner beckoned to the new parishioner mother. The LP was

whispering and the NP was listening intently. Then I saw the mother speak to her family and motion for them to move. I knew what had happened. They had been warned. These seats are not open.

We will soon gather on Holy Thursday. We will hear John's story of Jesus and his disciples at table together before the feast of Passover. I will listen, and hear, perhaps for the first time, how Jesus "rose from supper and took off his outer garments." He left his seat. He took off any of the clothes that might signify high rank or order. He put on an apron, the sign of the servant.


But before he could strip down and dress for the work of washing the disciples' feet, Jesus had to leave his seat—the seat, as painters have depicted it, at the head of the table, in the very front row.

Later in the same story, Jesus will tell Peter that he has to do what Jesus has done: get up from his seat and begin serving.

"I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do."

Jesus has given me a model to follow. But first, I have to get out of my seat.





CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP **Hidden Value?**

Long ago a great sculptor unveiled his latest work to a large crowd. With a flourish he swept off the cover, revealing an angel, which would be one of many in the Church where it was to be placed. But what an angel!

There was no wind in the sculptor's shop, yet this angel's wings seemed to be spreading to take flight. Marble can neither speak nor move, yet this angel's mouth appeared to bless, its hands to fold in prayer.

The audience burst into applause. One person dared to ask, "How did you do it?" The sculptor said, "I simply carved away everything except the angel."



"Everything except the angel" It seems like a joke, but it's not. Great sculptors have the gift to see the figure that already exists within the material and then use tools to remove what is extra, thus freeing the masterpiece.

As the Creator, God is the great Artist. Also, God sees all the art that has ever been and ever will be. By commanding us to be stewards, God tells us to become artists too, of our own souls.

Instead of a hammer and chisel, our tool is giving. Every time we give money to the church, it's like carving away a bit of "marble" to reveal more of our Christian nature.

Every hour spent helping in a food pantry, singing in a choir, teaching Religious Education, and so on, does the same.

Our hands may lack the sculptor's skill, but through Christian stewardship, we can make our lives move beautiful than any statue. — Stewardship, March 2008

Jesus called his friend from death by calling, "Lazarus, come out!" Just so, we receive the same call from Jesus every day to "come out" of our feelings of fear, anxiety, doubt and unbelief.

When we hand our lives to Christ, we strip away all the outer layers that build up in the world and hide our true inner beauty.

Lent is a perfect time to reflect on the fact that every aspect of our lives ~ our gifts as well as our sufferings ~ can lead to blessings for ourselves and others. All we need to do is surrender our lives to the Lord and the rest falls into place.




