Lift High the Cross of Christ!

As we continue our celebration of the Resurrection in these great Fifty Days, we are mindful that the only way to Resurrection is through the Cross!

The Cross is the major symbol of Christians. It is on the foundation of the Cross that our faith is built.

The Cross, and Jesus' approach to it, shows us the way in which we are to approach our crosses whatever they may be.

Jesus had a choice. He could either embrace his Cross or run away from it.

In faith, trusting in the Father, he embraced the Cross. He did not fight it, resist it, or run away from it. He surrendered.

In that faithful surrender and embrace of the Cross, evil was transformed and changed into Good News—the Resurrection—new life, new hope, and new beginnings for the entire universe!

We human beings spend so much time running away from the crosses that come into our lives. We deny them. We pretend and lie to others that they do not exist. We medicate them. We abandon them. In all these ways, though, they are still there!

The suffering, the pain, the illness, the death, or the sin is still very much present. The more we try to ignore or run away from our crosses, the more ill health, physically, emotionally, and spiritually we cause for ourselves and others. It is only in our embrace of the cross that transformation and healing take place.

When we acknowledge and embrace our crosses and lift them high in faith, they become the very instruments that bring new life, new hope, and new beginnings. The instrument of death becomes the instrument of life.

M. Scott Peck writes, "I cannot be any more specific about the methodology of love than to quote these words of an old priest who spent many years in the battle: 'There are dozens of ways to

deal with evil and several ways to conquer it. All of them are facets of the truth that the only ultimate way to conquer evil is to let it be smothered within a willing, living human being. When it is absorbed there like blood in a sponge or a spear into one's heart, it loses its power and goes no further.' The healing of evil—scientifically or otherwise—can be accomplished only by the love of individuals. A willing sacrifice is required...I do not know how this occurs. But I know that it does... Whenever this happens there is a slight shift in the balance of power in the world."

As we celebrate Resurrection in these great Fifty Days, let us continue to embrace our crosses, unite them to Christ, and lift high the Cross of Christ!


HEAVEN WEDS EARTH

At the Vigil on the night before Easter, in the ancient hymn of thanks for the light of the Easter candle (the *Exultet*), we heard the minister sing: "O night truly blessed, when heaven is wedded to earth and humanity is reconciled with God!" Christ is the groom, the church is the bride. Easter eve was our wedding night. Have you ever read the book in the Bible named Song of Songs? It's a stirring love story. The early church liked to understand it as Christ's love song to his bride—us.

Christ is also the rising sun. As the moon reflects the light of the sun, we who are baptized must reflect the light of Christ. (Remember how we shared the one flame of the paschal candle among us that night? It is, as the *Exultet* says, "a flame divided but undimmed.") The Syrian Orthodox wedding liturgy tells us: "The bridegroom is like the sun, the bride is like the moon, and all the wedding symbolizes the dawn which gladdens the earth." This Eastertide is the dawn that gladdens the earth!

St. Mark the Evangelist

Most of what we know about Mark comes directly from the New Testament. He is usually identified with the Mark of Acts 12:12. (When Peter escaped from prison, he went to the home of Mark's mother.)

Paul and Barnabas took him along on the first missionary journey, but for some reason Mark returned alone to Jerusalem. It is evident, from Paul's refusal to let Mark accompany him on the second journey despite Barnabas's insistence, that Mark had displeased Paul. Later, Paul asks

Mark to visit him in prison so we may assume the trouble did not last long.

The oldest and the shortest of the four Gospels, the Gospel of Mark emphasizes Jesus' rejection by humanity while being God's triumphant envoy. Probably written for Gentile converts in Rome—after the death of Peter and Paul sometime between A.D. 60 and 70—Mark's Gospel is the gradual manifestation of a "scandal": a crucified Messiah.

Evidently a friend of Mark (Peter called him "my son"), Peter is only one of the Gospel sources, others being the Church in Jerusalem (Jewish roots) and the Church at Antioch (largely Gentile).

Like one other Gospel writer, Luke, Mark was not one of the 12 apostles. We cannot be certain whether he knew Jesus personally. Some scholars feel that the evangelist is speaking of himself when describing the arrest of Jesus in Gethsemane: "Now a young man followed him wearing nothing but a linen cloth about his body. They seized him, but he left the cloth behind and ran off naked" (Mark 14:51-52).

Others hold Mark to be the first bishop of Alexandria, Egypt. Venice, famous for the Piazza San Marco, claims Mark as its patron saint; the large basilica there is believed to contain his remains.

A winged lion is Mark's symbol. The lion derives from Mark's description of John the Baptist as a "voice of one crying out in the desert" (Mark 1:3), which artists compared to a roaring lion. The wings come from the application of Ezekiel's vision of four winged creatures (Ezekiel, chapter one) to the evangelists.


Mark fulfilled in his life what every Christian is called to do: proclaim to all people the Good News that is the source of salvation. In particular, Mark's way was by writing. Others may proclaim the Good News by music, drama, poetry, or by teaching children around a family table.

When I have a warm home, help me to remember the homeless; When I am without pain, help me to remember those who suffer; And remembering, help me to destroy my complacency and


And remembering, help me to destroy my complacency and bestir my compassion.
