Saints Peter & Paul (died 64 AD and 67 AD)

St. Peter:

St. Mark ends the first half of his Gospel with a triumphant climax. He has recorded doubt, misunderstanding and the opposition of many to Jesus. Now Peter makes his great confession of faith: "You are the Messiah" (Mark 8:29b). It was one of the many glorious moments in Peter's life, beginning with the day he was called from his nets along the Sea of Galilee to become a fisher of people for Jesus.

The New Testament clearly shows Peter as the leader of the apostles, chosen by Jesus to have a special relationship with him. With James and John he was privileged to witness the Transfiguration, the raising of a dead child to life and the agony in Gethsemane. His mother-in-law was cured by Jesus. He was sent with John to prepare for the last Passover before Jesus' death. His name is first on every list of apostles.

And to Peter only did Jesus say, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father. And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the nether world shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven;

and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 16:17b-19).

But the Gospels prove their own veracity by the unflattering details they include about Peter. He clearly had no public relations person. It is a great comfort for ordinary mortals to know that Peter also has his human weakness, even in the presence of Jesus.

He generously gave up all things, yet he can ask in childish self-regard, "What are we going to get for all this?" (Matthew 19:27). He receives the full force of Christ's anger when he objects to the idea of a suffering Messiah: "Get behind me Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do" (Matthew 16:23b).

Peter is willing to accept Jesus' doctrine of forgiveness, but suggests a limit of seven times. He walks on the water in faith, but sinks in doubt. He refuses to let Jesus wash his feet, then wants his whole body cleansed. He swears at the Last Supper that

he will never deny Jesus, and then swears to a servant maid that he has never known the man. He loyally resists the first attempt to arrest Jesus by cutting off Malchus' ear, but in the end he runs away with the others. In the depth of his sorrow, Jesus looks on him and forgives him, and he goes out and sheds bitter tears.

St. Paul:

If Billy Graham suddenly began preaching that the United States should adopt Marxism and not rely on the Constitution, the angry reaction would help us understand Paul's life when he started preaching that Christ alone can save us. He had been the most Pharisaic of Pharisees, the most legalistic of Mosaic lawyers. Now he suddenly appears to other Jews as a heretical welcomer of Gentiles, a traitor and apostate.

Paul's central conviction was simple and absolute: only God can save humanity. No human effort – even the most scrupulous observance of law – can create a human good which we can bring to God as reparation for sin and payment for grace. To be saved from itself, from sin, from the devil and from death, humanity must open itself completely to the saving power of Jesus.

Paul never lost his love for his Jewish family, though he carried on a lifelong debate with them about the uselessness of the Law without Christ. He reminded the Gentiles that they were grafted on the parent stock of the Jews, who were still God's chosen people, the children of the promise.

In light of his preaching and teaching skills, Paul's name has surfaced (among others) as a possible patron saint of the Internet.

Ss. Peter & Paul

We would probably go to confession to Peter sooner than to any of the other apostles. He is perhaps a more striking example of the simple fact of holiness. Jesus says to us as he said, in effect, to Peter: "It is not you who have chosen me, but I who have chosen you. Peter, it is not human wisdom that makes it possible for you to believe, but my Father's revelation. I, not you, build my Church."

Paul's experience of the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus was the driving force that made him one of the most zealous, dynamic and courageous ambassadors of Christ the Church has ever had. But persecution, humiliation and weakness became his day-by-day carrying of the cross, material for further transformation. The dying Christ was in him; the living Christ was his life.

CELEBRATING SAUL OF TARSUS

In June 2007 Pope Benedict XVI announced that beginning on the solemnity of the apostles Sts. Peter and Paul in 2008, the church would celebrate a Jubilee Year commemorating the bimillennium of the birth of St. Paul.

Most of our information about Paul comes to us from two sources: his own letters and Acts of the Apostles. Other information comes from Christian tradition found in the writings of the patristic era. The tradition that Paul suffered martyrdom under the emperor Nero was part of the tradition found in the First Letter of Clement, written in the 90s. That his writings were viewed as significant in the wider church community is seen in the letters of Clement, Polycarp, and Ignatius. Their writings tell us that Paul's letters were circulating among the early church and viewed as authoritative by many believers.

A chronology of Paul's life is hard to achieve because we have sparse information about his life in relationship to outside historical events, but the general consensus places the beginning of his career as an apostle shortly after the resurrection, in the early 30s. It is probably better to speak of Paul's transformation rather than his conversion on the road to Damascus, since he views his newfound faith in Christ as an extension of his Jewish faith: for Paul. Jesus is the fulfillment of God's promises to Israel. In Romans he writes of his continued self-identification as "an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin" (11:1). Working as the apostle to the gentiles, Paul sees his task as one of bringing the good news of Jesus to the rest of the world in order to fulfill God's plan of offering salvation to all people, beginning with Israel.

First in the canon, though not first in authorship, is Paul's letter to the Romans, the longest of his known writings. The letter is thought to have been written while Paul was in Corinth in the mid-50s, making it one of his last letters.

Paul begins his letter by identifying himself as a "servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel" (1:1). Paul writes to "all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints" (v 7), a community he has not yet met but one he anticipates visiting. Paul reminds them that since they have been baptized into Christ Jesus "the spirit of God dwells in you" (8:9). Sharing in God's gift of the Spirit means that they will also come to share in the resurrection, as it is the same Spirit who raised Jesus (v 11). Using a dichotomy popular in Greek thought, Paul says that those who live by the Spirit must no longer live according to the flesh; they should strive to live according to the fruits of the Spirit that have been given to them (vv 12-13,23). Yet Paul knows that Christians are not disconnected from their bodies: in fact, he suffered in his body for the sake of the Gospel.

But for Paul his suffering is "not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us" (v 18). Paul anticipates a "redemption of our bodies" (v 23), when God will redeem us and raise us up with Christ Jesus, freeing our bodies from "bondage to decay and ... (giving us) the freedom of the glory of the children of God" (v 21). Writing with an awareness of the trials that some believers face, Paul reminds the Romans that God will not abandon them.

Nothing that life throws at us "will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (v 39), Paul assures us. It is with this belief that Paul was able to embrace his own martyrdom. The word "martyr" comes from a Greek word meaning "to witness." In life and death Paul witnessed to his faith. May his words and example inspire us to continue to live Spirit-filled lives in witness to our belief in God's love for us made known in Christ Jesus.

SS. PETER AND PAUL Sunday, June 29

One of the oldest saints' days in Rome, June 29 was dedicated to the memory of the apostles Peter and Paul as early as the fourth century. This day the church remembers two disciples who differed greatly in style and background, but who shared a tireless energy in spreading the gospel.


Rough-hewn and impulsive Peter left his fishing nets immediately to answer Jesus' call. Later, during the passion of Jesus, Peter made his denials just as impulsively, though he had pledged his loyalty to Jesus only that evening. Receiving Christ's gracious forgiveness after the resurrection, Peter went on to become the rock-steady and faithful leader of the disciples.

Once Paul, who had been a rigid and violent persecutor of Christians, experienced the love of Christ, he grew meek—though never shy. He founded many churches and was able to affirm the fledgling communities of believers even while he was admonishing them. Paul's writings are the first Christian scriptures; they are older than the gospels. After many imprisonments, Paul was executed during the reign of Nero.

Coastal countries like Chile and Paraguay remember Peter the fisherman with nautical parades. In Hungary and in rural England, people braid straw from the wheat harvest into crosses and crowns to honor the two martyr saints.

This year, their feast day occurs on a Sunday, so we celebrate these two apostles in place of the customary readings for the Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time.



CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

What we give to others, we give to Jesus . . .

On June 29 we celebrate the feasts of Saints Peter and Paul, who are both excellent examples of those who free themselves to follow the Lord. The two apostles are celebrated together as the founders of the early Church of Rome.

St. Peter held a preeminent status among Jesus' disciples. He was very close to Jesus and is the apostle Jesus designated as the "rock" upon which his Church would be built. Even St. Paul acknowledged St. Peter as the pillar of the Church in Jerusalem and leader of the mission to the Gentiles.

The Gospel of St. Luke describes Jesus commissioning St. Peter as the head of the disciples. In the first of his letters contained in the New Testament, St. Peter penned the stewardship reflection placed so prominently in the United States Bishops' pastoral letter on Christian stewardship:

"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another a good stewards of God's varied grace."

-1 Peter 4:10

Thinkers throughout the ages acknowledge St. Paul as a genius and his success as a missionary was unmatched. He was a highly educated Jew and interpreted his conversion experience on the road to Damascus as Christ's personal call to preach the Good News to the Gentiles.



Paul left his home and legal authority—his comfort zone. He established Christian communities in the area of the eastern Mediterranean, is noted for three great missionary journeys and wrote letters to various communities.

St. Paul believed that stewardship over the gift of the Risen Christ was fundamental to eternal life. In today's reading, the "divine economy" of Christian stewardship is explained by St. Paul ~ "The relief of others

should not impoverish you; there should be a certain equality. Your plenty right now should supply their needs so that their surplus may in turn one day supply your need."


Leaving those things that are comfortable, familiar and routine in order to follow Jesus is not easy. For Christian stewards it is a life-long journey and a spiritual challenge.


