Interfaith Committee for Worker Justice News

In the past month, representatives from our parish have been joining other ICWJ members in meeting with staff from the offices of Assemblywoman Mimi Walters, Assemblyman Martin Garrick and Senator Mark Wyland.

Our concern in requesting these meetings centers around the California State budget crisis and its impact on the most vulnerable: the low income workers, handicapped children, the elderly and the sick. Our message to them contained these elements:

- We are aware that the Assembly and Senate are in Sacramento right now, debating the details of the budget.
- Governor Schwarzenegger has proposed drastic cuts to balance the budget and manage the budget crisis.
- As people of faith, the Interfaith Committee for Worker Justice believe that the budget is a moral document that reflects the values and priorities of a family, a community and a society.
- While the ICWJ recognizes the outstanding need to balance the budget, our clergy and faith leaders are concerned that this not be done on the backs of the state's most vulnerable community members.

The next few parish bulletins will contain more information about a document titled: *A Moral Budget for All Californians*, drafted by CLUE:Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice.



BEFORE YOU SAID AMEN

During the Eucharistic prayer at Mass today, what were you thinking about? What was on your mind from the moment the presider invited everyone to: "Lift up your hearts!" until you sang the "Amen" before the Our Father?

We Catholics say: This is the most holy time. But what does "holy" mean here, and how do you spend that holy time?

Most of us would admit that we tend to wander off a bit at this time on Sunday. Yes, we sing the "Holy Holy" pretty well, perhaps, with a strong "Hosanna in the highest!" But sometimes we don't focus back in until it's time for the Our Father. Where did we go?

We're pretty good at getting on board for the song that begins the liturgy, and sometimes very good at giving full attention to at least one of the readings and maybe the homily. But if someone were to tap you on the shoulder during the Our Father and say: All right, where were you the last five minutes? How would you answer this question?

This is not to ask: What did the priest just do? (We know that!) The crucial question is: After I said "yes" to the invitation to lift up my heart, after we all said "yes" to that, what happened to those hearts? Did they stay "lifted up"?

Come at it this way. What happens in your life, happens with some regularity, that grabs and holds your whole attention—and grabs and hold you? That's what is asked when we are told to lift up our hearts. We are asked not simply to be quiet and attentive (that can happen at a good movie or



concert). For us as baptized people, we are asked to lift up and give God our whole selves, engaged with all these other selves. altar. around this What's it like to be totally involved in some deed even for a few minutes? Next time, can you enter into the Eucharistic prayer in this way?

ORDINARY TIME: SUMMER

A Sense of the Season

What do the words Ordinary Time mean? Dorothy Day said, "The words 'Ordinary Time' in our prayer books put me in a state of confusion and irritation. To me, no time is ordinary." She was right. The Ordinary in "Ordinary Time" refers to ordinal—counted—time, not to a lack of something to celebrate. The Roman document, General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar, says: "Apart from those seasons having their own distinctive character [Advent, Christmastime, Lent, Triduum and Eastertime], 33 or 34 weeks remain in the yearly cycle that do not celebrate a specific aspect of the mystery of Christ. Rather, especially on the Sundays, they are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects."

How do we celebrate "the mystery of Christ in all its aspects"? We gather every Sunday. Sunday is our original feast day. Christians have gathered every Sunday—the day of Christ's resurrection, the first day of the week—ever since there were Christians.

When we gather on Sundays in Ordinary Time, as always, we hear the scriptures proclaimed. The church reads straight through "the gospel of the year," either Matthew, Mark or Luke, each week often picking up where we left off last week. (We read John during Lent and Easter, and on feasts.) The first readings, from the first testament of the Bible, have been chosen for their relationship to the gospel passages. Many voices are heard throughout summer Ordinary Time. We also read through some of the letters of the second testament of the Bible. The mystery of Christ "in all its aspects" unfolds.

What is the heart of our Sunday celebration? We do our eucharist; that is, we do our thanksgiving. We praise and thank God for all creation; we pray for the whole world, as we remember Christ's life, death and resurrection. We share the bread and wine, the body and blood. We are sent forth to be the body and blood of Christ in our homes, our workplaces, our neighborhoods, our towns, our cities, our country, our world.

"What happens in our churches every Sunday is the fruit of our week. What happens as the fruit of the week past is the beginning of the week to come. Sunday is simultaneously a point of arrival and departure for Christians on their way to the fullness of the kingdom. This is not ordinary at all. This is the fabric of Christian living." (Saint Andrew Bible Missal)

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Our Lives ~ Sacred Trusts

Human life is the first and greatest gift of all and carries with it some great responsibilities. The readings today, while examples from long ago, still hold strong and significant meaning today.

If we don't water and care for the seeds God has planted in us, we are not fulfilling our mission in life as Christian stewards.

Nineteenth century American industrialist Andrew Carnegie not only made a fortune, he gave much of it away, and he credited his success to insight and hard work. "The average person puts only 25 percent of his energy and ability into his work. The world takes off its hat to those who put in more than 50 percent of their capacity, and stands on its head for those few and far between souls who devote 100 percent."

When asked the nature of his success, the co-founder of Holiday Inns, K. Wilson, wryly noted, "I make it a point to put in a good half day of work every day. Sometimes it's the first twelve hours, sometimes it's the second." Movie producer Samuel Goldwyn was fond of saying, "The harder I work, the luckier I get." And Thomas Edison explained the importance of hard work this way: "Of inspiration one percent, of perspiration, ninety-nine."

Hard work still helps define the most successful among us. Comedian Mike Myers has wisely suggested that the single greatest difference between him and his funnier friends was his unwillingness to quit. He stayed the course, developing material long after his friends had given up comedy for something else.

What we often forget, though, is the set of contributions made by the Master Architect in each of our lives.




An industrious farmer understands the relationship between hard work and God's provision all too well. In Psalm 65, David stated it clearly: "You visit the earth and water it, make it abundantly fertile. God's

stream is filled with water; with it you supply the world with grain. With showers you keep the ground soft, blessing its young sprouts." And, in the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus reminded us that God's blessing extends to those who acknowledge him as God, but also to those who choose not to: "He makes his sun rise on the bad and the good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust."

A good mind is a gift from God. So are two good hands. So is vision. And so is the blessing of having been born at a time and in a place that not only rewards hard work but provides ample opportunity to pursue innumerable possibilities for success of all kinds. Sure, success—including financial success—comes to those willing to work for it. God, however, is the one who opens doors, for God designed the original templates, initial blueprints, and formed the building blocks of all that is. The wise recognize God's gifts and are suitably humble. The work of the Lord is allencompassing and a blessing to those who acknowledge Him.
