In these days, all of us are busy about looking at our lives, the lives of our family members, our priorities, our goals, our employment, our recreation; yes, we are busy about looking at everything.

\$4.50/gallon of gas is now the lens through which we view all facets of our lives. Change is not on the horizon. Change is here!

All of us are feeling the pain as we are beginning to reprioritize our lives. All of sudden so many of those things that we thought were needed and essential now become expendable.

many, the decisions, already, are much more serious and grave than just letting go of a few extravagances.

This is a painful time. For many, it is already in crisis mode as households struggle with mortgage, car, and credit card payments.

The present economy is reshaping how we live, how we think, and how we will plan for the future.

The perspective with which we approach this moment will make all the difference in terms of how we will survive. As we face pain, the choice is always between "bitter" and "better."

We can be bitter about what is happening to us, become angry and disillusioned, or we can see the challenges as opportunities to become better.

If we see these challenges as ways of becoming better, we will see our painful realities as ways of growing closer to family members and friends, of looking at our lives and sorting out the weeds and the wheat, of playing in ways that truly are times of recreation, of slowing down and immersing ourselves in the present moment. Ultimately, this time can be a time in growing closer to God.

Sr. Joan Chittister said this about facing the unknown: "Newness is exciting but not always easy to accept. It often takes a great deal of faith to accept change in life. But then again, newness and change may be one of the few times in life that we really get the chance to believe that God is everywhere, even where we've never been before."

Because of our present economy, we are going places where we've never been before. But we are a people of faith, and we believe that God is everywhere, is with us now, and will be with us in our future.

As we embrace our painful realities, for some, much more painful than for others, we know that all things work for good for those who love God!

A budget is a moral document, reflecting the values and priorities of a family, a community, a society:

REASON: A responsible family creates a budget to make sure that their resources are sufficient for their needs.

COMPASSION: In times of budget shortfalls, no one in the family is left out.

FAIRNESS: Our faith traditions advocate for a community where the needs of each person are equally valued and respected.

RESPONSIBLE INVESTMENT: The statewide budget should convey the government's priority to invest in the well-being of all people in our society.

STEWARDSHIP: California cannot become a state that only serves those who have already been blessed with good incomes and social stability.

All Religions proclaim our responsibility to care for those among us most in need. Religions highlighted this week:

ROMAN CATHOLIC

The basis for all that the Church believes about the moral dimensions of economic life is its vision of the transcendent worth—the sacredness—of human beings. The dignity of the human person realized in community with others, is the criterion against which all aspects of economic life must be measured. —U.S. Bishops, Economic Justice for All, No. 28 (1986)

EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN

Through human decisions and actions, God is at work in economic life. Economic life is intended to be a means through which God's purposes for humankind and creation are to be served. When this does not occur, as a church we cannot remain silent because of who and whose we are. —Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, "Economic Life: Sufficient, Sustainable Livelihood for All," (1999)



Mass Times Trust was started in 1993 by Robert A. Hummel and has grown over the years. In 2004, Mass Times began sharing information on 93,000

ST. ALPHONSUS LIGOURI

Moral theology, Vatican II said, should be more thoroughly nourished by Scripture, and show the nobility of the Christian vocation of the faithful and their obligation to bring forth fruit in charity for the life of the world. Alphonsus, declared patron of moral theologians in 1950, would rejoice in that statement. In his day, he fought for the liberation of moral theology, concentrating on the practical and concrete problems of pastors and confessors.

He founded the Redemptorist congregation in 1732. It was an association of priests and brothers living a common life, dedicated to the imitation of Christ, and working mainly in popular missions for peasants in rural areas.

Alphonsus' great pastoral reforms were in the pulpit and confessional—replacing the pompous oratory of the time with simplicity, and the rigorism of Jansenism with kindness. His great fame as a writer has somewhat eclipsed the fact that for 26 years he traveled up and down the Kingdom of Naples, preaching popular missions.

At 71 he was afflicted with rheumatic pains which left incurable bending of his neck; until it was straightened a little, the pressure of his chin caused a raw wound on his chest. He suffered a final 18 months of "dark night" scruples, fears, temptations against every article of faith and every virtue, interspersed with intervals of light and relief, when ecstasies were frequent.

St. Alphonsus was known above all as a practical man who dealt in the concrete rather than the abstract. His life is indeed a "practical" model for the everyday Christian who has difficulty recognizing the dignity of Christian life amid the swirl of problems, pain, misunderstanding, and failure. Alphonsus suffered all these things.





CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Why We Are Here

Many of us set goals from time to time, and some even manage to stay on course to reach those goals! The question is what kind of goals are we setting and why. Do we set only physical goals or do we set goals to fulfill our God-given purpose in life?

Understanding our purpose is not always easy. And accepting the challenge to fulfill our purpose might not be so easy either. It might get in the way of our opinion of why we are here in the first place. Material possessions might have to take a back seat.

When we spend time in prayer God talks to us about our purpose. This is when God lets us in on why we were created and what is expected of us now that we are here.



The story is told of a hot air balloonist who, years ago, planned a long trip over a vast area. He very carefully planned his itinerary, knowing exactly where he would stop on which day. He took off, confident that he would be able to stick to his plan and follow his itinerary.

However, he had not planned adequately for the wind from the mountains. For the first four days the wind blew him off course. He ended up in towns he'd never been to and didn't know anything about. But in each town where he landed, the hot air balloonist was heard to say, "Had I known about this place I would have planned all along to land here."

Life sometimes takes us off course. . . or at least the course we so carefully planned for ourselves. No matter where or how we live, God makes our purpose known to us, calls us to devote ourselves to that purpose and promises to help us fulfill it.

In the first reading today, Solomon humbly and wisely asked God for the gift of understanding so that he might know how to carry out his mission and purpose in life.

We know that God has a rationale for our life that fits into His plan. None of us was born to live random lives, void of purpose. We need to keep the faith and be true to the purpose God has set out for us. This requires faith and obedience.


A famous evangelist once made a distinction between types of faith. He pointed out three types of faith:

- ♦ A *struggling faith*, which he likened to someone thrashing around in deep water.
- A clinging faith, which he compared to a person hanging on to the side of a boat.
- A resting faith, which finds a person safe and secure inside the boat.

Resting faith is, of course, the kind of faith God wants us to have. We then are able to trust and understand exactly why we are here and how we are supposed to live. Few and far between are the people who end up with their original map.
