Principles of Dialogue

The word "polarized" is often used today to describe the reality of our world and Church. People seem to be at opposite poles on so many crucial issues.

How do we talk to one another? How do we find solutions to our problems? How do we find "common ground?"

I share with you these "Principles of Dialogue" taken from the Catholic Common Ground Initiative. These principles can help us, I believe, structure a conversation that brings people together to find common solutions to the differences that confront us.

These "Principles of Dialogue," although created for the Church, can easily be used for the political process.

As we prepare for the November Elections, let these principles help to guide us in our review and choices of candidates and propositions.

The Principles of Dialogue

1. We should recognize that no single group or viewpoint in the church has a complete monopoly on the truth. While the bishops united with the Pope have been

specially endowed by God with the power to preserve the true faith, they too exercise their office by taking counsel with one another and with the experience of the whole church, past and present. Solutions to the church's problems will almost inevitably emerge from a variety of sources.

- 2. We should not envision ourselves or any one part of the church a saving remnant. No group within the church should judge itself alone to be possessed of enlightenment or spurn the mass of Catholics, their leaders, or their institutions as unfaithful.
- 3. We should test all proposals for their pastoral realism and potential impact on living individuals as well as for their theological truth. Pastoral effectiveness is a responsibility of leadership.
- 4. We should presume that those with whom we differ are acting in good faith. They deserve civility, charity, and a good-faith effort to understand their concerns. We

- should not substitute labels, abstractions, or blanketing terms— "radical feminism," "the hierarchy," "the Vatican"—for living, complicated realities.
- 5. We should put the best possible construction on differing positions, addressing their strongest points rather than seizing upon the most vulnerable aspects in order to discredit them. We should detect the valid insights and legitimate worries that may underlie even questionable arguments.
- 6. We should be cautious in ascribing motives. We should not impugn another's love of the church and loyalty to it. We should not rush to interpret disagreements as conflicts of starkly opposing principles rather than as differences in degree or in prudential pastoral judgments about the relevant facts.
- 7. We should bring the church to engage the realities of contemporary culture, not by simple defiance or by naïve acquiescence, but acknowledging, in the fashion of Gaudiam et Spes, both our culture's valid achievements and real dangers.

The books of Hosea, Amos, and Micah are three books of the Book of the Twelve, which is a collection of various shorter prophetic books that have frequently been called the Minor Prophets. The term "minor" refers to the length of composition, in comparison to those of Major Prophets; for example, Isaiah.

The prophetic books are not easy to read. The prophets were for the most part activists rather than authors, more engaged in preaching than in the activity of writing. "By prophecy, we understand not specifically or even principally the forecasting of the future—but rather the mediation and interpretation of the divine mind and will."

"Most of the 175,000 state workers who (were) due a monthly paycheck on August 29 would have their pay cut to the federal minimum wage, \$6.65 an hour. . . .(A)bout 30,000 managers and supervisors would be cut to \$455 a week, and 8,000 attorneys and physicians would not be paid, said Lynelle Jolley, spokeswoman for the governor's Department of Personnel Administration." —Ed Mendel, San Diego Union Tribune

COWORKERS IN GOD'S SERVICE

Prisca, Aquila, Apollos, Eudora, Syntyche, Clement, Epaphras, Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, Luke, Epaenetus, Mary, Andronicus, Junia... Who are these people? These are Paul's "coworkers," so called by the disciple in his letters (Rom 16:3; 1 Cor 3:9; Philippians 4:11; Philemon 1:24). He also recognized the works of many who are unnamed, yet whom he calls "my other coworkers, whose names are in the book of life" (Philippians 4:3).

Most of us have had coworkers in our lives: in a job, on a committee, in an office. Those relationships are often united around a common purpose such. Paul's coworkers were united in spreading the Gospel mission and preaching the Good News.

The church today continues to explore how to spread the Gospel and preach the Good News. While acknowledging the service of the ordained ministry, the American bishops recognize that lay persons, including many vowed religious men and women, serve within church structures in many ecclesial roles. Many persons name their baptismal identity as a central focus for their vocation and ministry. These ministers strive to work together in collaborative ways to serve within the church, especially in parish communities.

The emerging sense of the baptismal call of all people has led to an explosion of programs in ministry formation, spiritual development, and church leadership. The deepening of that call has led many people to become actively engaged in the Gospel mission as well as the parish mission and vision. These are the coworkers Paul envisioned working together to serve God and one another. These are the many whose names are in the book of life, and who, like Prisca and Aquila, "risked their necks" for him and the Gospel (Rom 16:4).

The layers of ministry and service extend into the parish community and neighborhood like ripples on a lake. "Go forth to love and serve the world," heard at the end of every Eucharistic banquet, gives us all marching orders. Paul knew the mission needed to be done together. The Spirit has showered us with an abundance of gifts. The waters of baptism have poured forth graces and blessings for service. Paul's own missionary zeal might be astonished at the way the modern-day parish explodes with many coworkers who co-labor to spread the Good News.



Dear Parents,

Do you have a child between the ages of 3 and 17 attending public school?

St. Thomas More parish would like to enter into a partnership with you in the religious education of your child. We call it a "partnership" because we do not want to take over the responsibility of educating your child in the Catholic faith, but we do want to be a support and resource for you, as you fulfill the commitment you made when your child was baptized.



Daily living of our Catholic faith definitely takes place in the home and neighborhood within the context of the family. The Renewal of Our Minds

The Sunday newspapers are filled with back-to-school sales ads. School principals and teachers are preparing their schedules, curricula, and classrooms. Practice for fall sports has already begun, and new students are going through requisite orientations.

As the anticipation for the new school year begins, it is fitting to reflect on the discipline of Christian stewardship as it relates to our education.

Education is a life long activity, which begins at birth and continues until a person passes on to the Lord. It is so important to the development of a individual and society that it is cherished and fostered in every age and culture. Education can be formal or informal; for the very young and for society's matriarchs and patriarchs; and for all whose minds continuously react to personal needs, societal expectations, material circumstances, and ever changing political and economic realities.

For the Christian steward, the acquisition of knowledge and problem-solving skills, however, it is not an end in itself. The good steward recognizes that we have been given stewardship of the earth and have a responsibility to make the world a better place. Knowledge and skills must be put to work to create practical solutions for human challenges.



In one's own prayerful discernment, some stewardship questions at this time of year might include:

For students: Do I take my studies seriously? Am I living up to my potential? Do I live and actively give witness to my Catholic faith at school?

For parents and others entrusted with the care of students: As the primary educators, are we inspiring a life-long passion for learning? Are we cultivating a sense of hard work and good study habits? Are we helping our charges not only to achieve in the classroom, but to grow in their faith?

For Catholics who are educators: Are we doing the best we can to help our students reach their God-given potential? Are we helping them to become responsible, productive citizens? Do we give witness to our own Christ-centered values in the learning process so these values will be a part of their journey of faith?

During his visit to the United States, Pope Benedict XVI had much to say about the relationship between education and our responsibility to proclaim the Gospel in word and deed.

Education concerns itself with the ongoing renewal of our minds. Our Holy Father urges us to use this continued renewal to grow in our faith. For good stewards, education is a profound way by which we learn to do good, seek justice, relieve the oppressed, and draw people of all ages into communion with God and each other. (cf.
