#### A Discipline of the Heart

Hopefully, we see our journey of life as a spiritual journey. We are a people who have come from "somewhere" and we are a people going "somewhere."

We have purpose, meaning, and destiny. In our modern world, filled with so many distractions, we can easily get "disconnected." We become lost, and frightened; we act out accordingly.

October, in the Catholic Church, is "Respect Life" month. We take time, in a special way, to weave the connections between all life issues. The very first step, though, is to take time, with and for ourselves, to get "in touch" with life.

To keep focused, we need to be disciplined. I share with you the words of Fr. Henri Nouwen, taken from "Letters to Marc about Jesus":

#### A Discipline of the Heart

"The spiritual life demands a discipline of the heart. Discipline is the mark of a disciple of Jesus. That doesn't mean, however, making things difficult for yourself, but

making available the inner space where God can touch you with an all-transforming love. We human beings are so faint-hearted that we have a lot of trouble leaving an empty space empty. We like to fill it all up with ideas, plans, duties, tasks, and activities.

It strikes me increasingly just how hard-pressed people are nowadays. It's as though they're tearing about from one emergency to another. Never solitary, never still, never really free but always busy about something that just can't wait. You get the impression that amid this hurly-burly, we lose touch with life itself. We have the experience of being busy while nothing really seems to happen. The more agitated we are, and the more compacted our lives become, the more difficult it is to keep a space where God can let something truly new take place.

The discipline of the heart helps us to let God into our hearts so that God can become known to us there, in the deepest recesses of our own being. This is not so easy to do; we like to be master in our own house and don't want to admit that our house is God's house too."

Our newly-formed "Parish Social Justice" Committee (PSJ) wants to keep you informed about current social justice issues in our local community and the action that members of STM, along with other local congregations, have taken.

Most recently, we have been working with the Interfaith Committee for Worker Justice (ICWJ) in support of the workers at Tri-City hospital, who have achieved ratification to form a Union. The negotiations between Management and the Union, to establish a contract, are in full swing. Members of congregations in Oceanside, Carlsbad, and Vista are observers at the table, to demonstrate to the management of Tri-City Medical Center that local Congregations involved with ICWJ, and who live in the Tri-City area are supporting the workers there to insure a just contract and fair labor practices. As these negotiations continue, members of the Churches of Interfaith Committee for Worker Justice will also continue to be present. The workers are extremely grateful for our support.



# So, Tell Us What You REALLY THINK!!!

**Fr. Mike's Bookies** returns this fall, and on November 5 at 9:00am and 7:00pm, your Director of Music puts his job on the line to lead a discussion of Thomas Day's provocatively titled book, *Why Catholics Can't Sing: The Culture of Catholicism and the Triumph of Bad Taste*.

# There is still time to pick up a book and read it before our discussion day!

In chapter one, Day sets the scene:

Contemplate this very odd situation.

Today, a large number of Roman Catholics in the United States who go to church regularly—perhaps the majority—rarely or barely sing any of the music. If you think about it, this stands out as a most curious development in the history of Christianity.

What could possibly cause this odd behavior of American Catholics? The problem is certainly not one of unfamiliarity. The "new music" and the practice of singing during a liturgy were introduced into the American "mainstream" parish over twenty years ago...Are American Catholics offering some kind of resistance to the liturgical innovations that hit them in the 1960s? If we can judge from all the polls, the answer is no. Most Catholics say they are in favor of "the changes," even though they do not seem to ratify them in song. What is going on here? Why do the polls tell us one thing and why does a visit to almost any parish seem to tell us that a sullen rebellion is taking place? Why won't Catholics sing?

The Catholic world has been in a state of transition since the changes wrought by the Second Vatican Council that continues even to the present. Forty years on, we continue to adjust to this "new" approach—emotionally, liturgically, musically.

Written in 1990, Thomas Day's book can be seen as a response to the culture and practice of American Catholic music twenty years after the Vatican II.

Day grabs one's attention and does not let it go. Every page is interesting, and what he is writing strikes one a eminently true.

Let's see if his concerns remain true today. I look forward to hearing from you at our discussion on November 5.

# THE FEAST OF ALL SOULS


#### Sunday, November 2

The month of November is a special time in our Church for remembering our beloved dead, especially on the Feast of All Souls, which occurs this year on Sunday, November 2.

The evening Mass on Saturday, November 1, and both Masses on Sunday, November 2, will be a special commemoration of all who have died this past year, in particular, our own parishioners whose funerals were celebrated here, as well as family members whose funerals were celebrated elsewhere but for whom parish families have requested our prayerful support. The Parish's Book of the Dead will be available so that we can inscribe the names of our beloved dead, inviting the Parish to remember them in prayer during the month.

At each Mass, the worship aid will list the names of our Parish's beloved dead. Candles with names on them will be lit during Mass and placed in front of the altar. The names of our deceased will be lifted up in prayer during the Prayers of Intercession.

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. Amen.



Giving needs no more apology than does praying. In the Bible there are 1,539 passages that reference giving, while there are only 523 that refer to praying!

We all have obligations to pay our bills. Generally speaking, the number of bills we pay is directly proportionate to the choices we have made in living our lives. Exceptions happen with some of us who have medical expenses for ourselves and family members (not covered by insurance) that take a toll. Others find themselves helping family members in unanticipated times of need. Still others find themselves out of work in a tough job market.

As I reflect back on my life to date, it occurs to me that the best times—in many cases—were the worst times financially. Those were the times when our family had to dig in to survive, and in doing so we were reminded of the things that truly mattered in life. We developed a mutual respect borne of *extra* hard work and sacrifice, and appreciated the 'little things' a lot more.

I have been saving a piece that was sent to me awhile back and this week I share it with you, as a reflection during these days.

A group of graduates, well established in their careers were talking at a reunion and decided to go visit their old university professor, now retired. During their visit the conversation turned to complaints about stress in the work and lives.

Offering his guests hot chocolate, the professor went into the kitchen and returned with a large pot of hot chocolate and assortment of cups—porcelain, glass, crystal, some plain looking, some expensive, some exquisite—telling them to help themselves to the hot chocolate.

When they all had their drinks in hand, the professor said, "Notice that all the nice looking, expensive cups were taken, leaving behind the plain and cheap ones. While it is normal for you to want only the best for yourselves, that is the source of your problems and stress. The cup that you're drinking from adds nothing to the quality of the hot chocolate. In most cases it is just more expensive and in some cases even hides what we drink. What all of you really wanted was hot chocolate, not the cup; but you consciously went for the best cups...and then you began eyeing each other's cups.

Now consider this: Life is the hot chocolate; your job, money and position in society are the cups. They are just tools to hold and contain life. The cup you have does not define you, nor change your quality of the life. Sometimes, by concentrating only on the cup, we fail to enjoy the hot chocolate. God has provided for us. God makes the hot chocolate; man chooses the cups.

The happiest people don't have the best of everything. They just make the best of everything they have.

It's not how much of my money will I give to God, but how much of God's money will I keep for myself.
