Time for Silence

As we continue our journey through Advent, may these thoughts of Rev. Federico Lombardi, SJ, be helpful to us:

There is an interior and spiritual dimension of life that must be guarded and nourished. If it is not, it can become barren to the point of drying up and, indeed, dying.

Reflection, meditation, contemplation are as necessary as breathing. Time for silence—external but above all internal—are a premise and an indispensable condition for it.

In the age of the cell phone and the internet it is probably more difficult than before to protect silence and to nourish the interior dimension of life. It is difficult but necessary.

For believers, in this prayer dimension, dialogue with God is developed, life in the spirit, which is more important than physical life itself. Jesus told us not to fear those who can kill the body as much as the one who can destroy our soul.

Oplatki—Christmas Wafers

The word Bethlehem means "House of Bread." The breaking of bread is a sign of charity, unity, and friendship.

Religious family traditions and customs bring the truths of Faith into the home.

One of these beautiful Christmas customs is the Christmas Wafer. A Wafer bearing a simple design



commemorative of Christ's birth is given to everyone present gathered together for the Christmas meal.

With a simple prayer for God's grace and the welfare of the present and absent members of the family, the designated family member then invites everyone to go to another person, and with a gesture of a hug, kiss, or handshake, ask forgiveness for anything they may have done to hurt that family member in the past year, and to seek God's blessings upon them in the coming year.

Each person, as the words are said, then breaks a piece off of each other's Wafer and consumes the piece that has been broken off.

The spiritual lesson in this age old custom is unity of the family—the main pillar of society. The bond of unity is the Christ-like charity that should exist among the members of the family.

The members of the family are the links in the unbroken chain of One Body, One Bread, One Christ, and the One Church. The family is part of the eternal procession no matter where they are. For there is a universal longing to be always with one another, with God.

All this brings to mind clearly our charity for one another, to seek salvation together. Family customs remind us that we seek and obtain salvation with the help of others at all times.

These Christmas Wafers, and the home ritual surrounding their use, originated in Poland. This custom and ritual is also popular in Slovakia, Lithuania, Ukraine, and other parts of Catholic Eastern Europe.

Christmas Wafers (Oplatki) are available after Mass at the information Table on the plaza this weekend and in the coming weeks before Christmas. The Wafers are free, but donations will be accepted.

I encourage you to make this home ritual a part of your Christmas traditions.

We give thanks to Parishioners, Ed and Clarice Bednarz, who have provided us with these Christmas Wafers.

Seniors Special Needs and Services

Are you aware that there are many services for seniors with special needs in North County? One of the services is Interfaith Community Services, which helps elderly seniors in many ways. The Case Management Services component focuses on enabling seniors to remain in their homes and feel safe. This service provides intensive hands-on assistance in working through the maze of health and social services, providing assistance with emergent needs such as food, transportation, finances, housing, emergency assistance, and medical/dental resources, and responding to individual crisis situations. This service is free to seniors 55 and older. Through Project CARE (Community Action to Reach the Elderly), Interfaith Community Services provides help to the elderly and disabled seniors. This non-profit organization has served the North County community for over 23 years. There is also a "Minor Home Modification" program funded by Aging and Independent Services. CELEBRATING MARY

In an unusual occurrence, two of the major feasts celebrating Mary occur in the same week this year.

The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Patroness of the United States of America December 8

In Luke 1:28 the angel Gabriel, speaking on God's behalf, addresses Mary as "full of grace" (or "highly favored"). In that context this phrase means that Mary is receiving all the special divine help necessary for the task ahead. The Holy Spirit led the Church, especially non-theologians, to the insight that Mary had to be the most perfect work of God next to the Incarnation. Or rather, Mary's intimate association with the Incarnation called for the special involvement of God in Mary's whole life. The logic of piety helped God's people to believe that Mary was full of grace and free of sin from the first moment of her existence. Moreover, this great privilege of Mary is the highlight of all that God has done in Jesus. Rightly understood, the incomparable holiness of Mary shows forth the incomparable goodness of God.

Our Lady of Guadalupe Patroness of the Americas December 12

A poor Indian named Cuauhtlatohuac was baptized and given the name Juan Diego. He was a 57-year-old widower and lived in a small village near Mexico City. On Saturday morning, December 9, 1531, he was on his way to a nearby barrio to attend Mass in honor of Our Lady.

He was walking by a hill called Tepeyac when he heard beautiful music like the warbling of birds. A radiant cloud appeared and within it a young Native American maiden dressed like an Aztec princess. The lady spoke to him in his own language and sent him to the bishop of Mexico, a Franciscan named Juan de Zumarraga. The bishop was to build a chapel in the place where the lady appeared.

Eventually the bishop told Juan Diego to have the lady give him a sign. About this same time Juan Diego's uncle became seriously ill. This led poor Diego to try to avoid the lady. The lady found Diego, nevertheless, assured him that his uncle would recover and provided roses for Juan to carry to the bishop in his cape or tilma.

When Juan Diego opened his tilma in the bishop's presence, the roses fell to the ground and the bishop sank to his knees. On Juan Diego's tilma appeared an image of Mary as she had appeared at the hill of Tepeyac. It was December 12, 1531.




AT THE CHURCH OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI



CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Attitude of Gratitude

Advent greets us with the reminder that while we await "new heavens and a new earth," we are to make ready a way for the Lord. John the Baptist makes clear that God's plans for us are not just for the future. We are working on God's clock, and not ours.

A timer, if you will, has been set on each one of our lives and it has been activated. God has gifted each of us in unique ways and expects us to stay busy fulfilling our various purposes.

As the clock silently ticks away, with God at the helm, many are busy doing good works. They never look for recognition. There is definitely a warmth about these folks. . . an attitude of gratitude!

Meanwhile, others spend a lot of time complaining. God's clock is ticking, but instead of getting busy to make things better (in any number of ways) their time is spent in a blame-game. The "all about me" attitude emanates from this corner.

Following is a great example of a "Gratitude Attitude" . . .

I awoke this morning and was greeted by an early winter snow storm that had fallen on our region overnight. As I surveyed my yard from the comfort of the house, I was amazed to see nearly three feet of snow drifted at the side door. My reaction to this unusual mid-November snowfall was quite opposite of how I remembered embracing winter as a child. What I was feeling could only be described as "short of gratitude."

After a deep breath, I donned my extensive winter gear, grabbed my new yellow shovel and headed for the driveway. "Thank goodness, the snow is only about a foot deep in most of the driveway," I thought as I began to clear the side entrance.

It took me 15 minutes to clear the tiny area leading to the side of the house and I calculated how long it was going to take to shovel the entire driveway. The snow was wet and heavy making this more difficult. "I'll be out here all day," I thought in self-pity.

As I started clearing the snow in front of the garage door, I heard the sound of a neighbor's snow-blower grow louder. I looked up to see Matt heading up the street to our place. Needless to say, my heart skipped a beat and my back sighed in relief.

In 20 minutes he cleared 80% of our driveway while I continued my shoveling to reach the more difficult-to-reach places. Matt's generosity added two hours to my day. I earnestly thanked him as he went home to make some minor repairs that were needed as a result of helping me.

As I was relating this story to friends over the phone, I looked out the window to see Matt wheeling his repaired snow-blower across the street helping still another neighbor.

Matt didn't wait for people to come to him for help. Rather, he sought out those in need, and offered his gifts in humble service, which is a wonderful witness to Christian stewardship.

As we prepare ourselves in anticipation of Christ's birth this Advent season, let us imitate Matt's love for his neighbors this cold, snowy day. Let us open our hearts and find neighbors (that we know and also those we don't know) to serve. —Steve Foran

Year-End Checklist

- Keep all gift receipts and acknowledgment letters, especially for gifts of \$250 or more.
- If you sold securities this year and will owe capital gains tax, remember that gifts of cash or other securities may partially or fully offset any tax on your gains.
- ♦ Annual Catholic Appeal payments? Any parishioners with a balance due on their pledges made to this year's ACA are requested to conclude their payments before December 31, 2008. Thank you to all who have already fulfilled their pledges! (Tithing families, remember that your tithe covers your ACA contribution.)
- ♦ BE SURE TO <u>COMPLETE</u> all gifts by December 31 to qualify for tax savings on this year's tax return. Advance planning with the parish office is essential, since the office will be closed from December 24 at noon-January 2, 2009. Gifts received in the offertory at Masses the weekend of December 27-28 will be credited for year ending 2008.
