Pastor's Column

Bishops to G8: "Bring a Light of Hope"

The Group of Eight (G8) Summit is an annual meeting attended by the leaders of eight countries: Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Russia, the United Kingdom, and the United States of America, and the President of the European Commission.

At the Summit, leaders freely and vigorously exchange opinions on a variety of issues facing the global community centering on economic and social problems. They work to reach a consensus to make top-down decisions. The results are then compiled into a declaration.

In a globalized world, countries are becoming increasingly interdependent. Events unfold with drastic speed and the impact of events becomes more significant beyond national borders. Flexible, resolute, and well-balanced decisions as well as effective measures are needed in order to deal with such a situation.

The host country of the Summit holds the G8 Presidency for the entire calendar year. The Presidency carries out preparatory meetings and prepares for the Summit meetings, Foreign Ministers' meeting and Finance Ministers' meeting. The Presidency may call for emergency meetings as necessary in light of international situations at any given time.

This year, the G8 Summit was held this past week in L'Aquila, Italy from July 8 to July 10. The international economic crisis and regional crises, food safety and security, the struggle against climate change, and the deregulation of world trade were the main issues on this year's agenda.

As this year's G8 Summit approached, the Heads of the Episcopal Conferences of the eight industrial superpowers sent a joint letter to their nations' leaders calling for the group to "take steps"

toward concrete action on "reducing poverty and addressing climate change." Their letter follows:

Dear Leaders of the Group of 8 Nations,

At a time of global financial and economic crisis, we write on behalf of the Catholic bishops' conferences in the G8 nations to urge you to take concerted actions to protect poor persons and assist developing countries at the upcoming G8 Summit in Italy.

As our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI, wrote in a letter to Prime Minister Gordon Brown prior to the G20 meeting which the Prime Minister hosted:

"The current crisis has raised the spectre of the cancellation of drastic reduction of external assistance programmes, especially for Africa and for less developed countries elsewhere. Development aid, including the commercial and financial conditions favourable to less developed countries and the cancellation of the external debt of the poorest and most indebted countries, has not been the cause of the crisis and, out of fundamental justice, must not be its victim."

Our moral tradition commits the Church to protecting human life and dignity, especially of the poorest, most vulnerable members of the human family. In the faces of poor persons the Catholic Church sees the face of Christ whom we serve in countries throughout the world.

Ironically poor people have contributed the least to the economic crisis facing our world, but their lives and livelihoods are likely to suffer the greatest devastation because they struggle at the margins in crushing poverty. In light of this fact, The G8 nations should met their responsibility to promote dialogue with other powerful economies to help prevent further economic crises. In addition, they should meet their commitments to increase Official Development Assistance in order to reduce global poverty and to achieve the Millennium Development Goals, especially in African countries. This requires deepening partnerships with developing countries so that their peoples can be active agents in their own development, participating in political, governmental, economic and social reforms that serve the common good of all. In a particular way it is important to strengthen peacekeeping so that armed conflicts do not continue to rob countries of the resources needed for development.

In a similar way, poor countries and peoples who have contributed the least to the human factors driving global climate change are most at risk of its harmful consequences. As Catholic pastors and teachers, we have a special concern for how climate change impacts the poor. Concrete commitments should be agreed upon and mechanisms should be created to mitigate additional global climate change and to help poor persons and developing nations adapt to its effects as well as to adopt appropriate technologies for sustainable development. Protecting the poor and the planet are not competing causes; they are moral priorities for all people living in this world.

The G8 Summit takes place in the shadow of a global economic crisis, but its actions can help bring a light of hope to our world. By asking first how a given policy will affect the poor and the

Get On the Bus

"A Window on the Bus" Report: Part 1 of 2 (Names have been changed.)

It's 4:00am and the buses, which departed El Cajon at 3:30am, stop in Oceanside to pick up more families, volunteers, and all the goodies for the two buses.

The children are sleepy but eyes brighten as blankets are distributed. A beautiful pink princess blanket for 4-year-old "Precious"; another with colorful animals and alphabets for 3-year-old "Maria"; a huge puppy blanket for "Amedeo."

A few quick diaper changes and we're off. Everyone settles in for a little more sleep.

Los Angeles—The sun begins to rise. "Anthony," who is nine and seems to be growing before my eyes, asks me when we are having breakfast. I share a banana with him, and he settles back to sleep.



Grapevine—Breakfast is served: cheese sticks, pastry, fruit, and orange juice. A little bit later, extra food is served. "Sure" says Anthony, "I'd like more bread and cheese!"

I chat with "Esther," who is very nervous about seeing her daughter because of their very fractured relationship. Yet she is determined to do this so that her grandson, whom she is raising, can see his mother. Her 50-year-old husband died last year, and she is also caring for her aged parents. Get On the Bus is the only way she can see her daughter.

Bakersfield—Time to collect trash and handout backpacks especially prepared for each child. Such delight! Children making friends across the aisle as they share the contents of their backpacks; pillows turning into "card tables," lots of coloring and reading going on; new game toys playing. Two 4-year-old girls are now piled together in one seat, holding hands and sharing a story with grandma.

Visalia—Children receive Mothers' Day cards and are invited to decorate the inside for their mom, using the crayons and markers from their backpacks.

The DVD Madagascar on closed circuit TV's.

Time passes: more diaper changes; "tent making" out of blankets and seat-switching to create "tent cities"; older kids napping, reading, texting.

"Anthony" is hungry again; bored, crawls into his tent for a nap.



Fresno—Time for all adults to fill out still more paperwork, listing all items taken into the prison: glasses, sweaters, hair clips, jewelry, etc.

Fifteen minutes from the prison—just outside of Fresno. Excitement is building, little ones are changed into appropriate clothes. Children put on their Get On the Bus t-shirts. The bus is cleaned up and backpacks are put in order. All is ready!

They suffer from malnourishment which stunts their development and hinders their ability to progress in school. These orphans need sponsors in order to provide food support, medical care and a school uniform. For a small \$35 per month donation, you can sponsor an orphan and bring real change to their lives and bring hope to their future. For those interested in participating, there will be tables on the Plaza after the Masses on July 18/19 where you can see the orphans who are in need of sponsorship. Employee Free Choice Act Update Postcard Campaign This Weekend

St. Thomas More's Campaign in support of the Employee Free Choice Act, which will be voted on by Congress in August, is in full swing. Bishop Gabino Zavala of the Archdiocese of L.A. and Co-President of the Interfaith for Worker Justice Board of Directors, reminds us that "The Employee Free Choice Act intends to address and counter some of the more egregious violations of workers' dignity that are today pervasive for so many workers. This legislation would allow workers to form and join unions as certainly and freely as they might join a church community or civic organization. Workers would be able to cast their vote for a union from the safety and security of their own home simply by signing and submitting union authorization cards. Additionally, the legislation would impose just penalties on employers who attempt to illegally interfere with this democratic right of their employees." We hope that all members of our STM Faith Community will stop after all the Masses this weekend and sign postcards to our Legislators, urging them to cast their vote in favor of the Employee Free Choice Act.

EXAMINING A TRAJECTORY OF CHANGE IN LITURGICAL MUSIC

Part II

In November 2007, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) issued a guideline on liturgical music entitled Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship.

In the document's foreword, the bishops write:

We pray that this document will draw all who worship the Lord into the fullness of liturgical, musical prayer.

This is part two of an exploration of some of the documents that led up to Sing to the Lord and that have set the stage for our approach to music-making in Church today.

1947, Mediator Dei **Pope Pius XII**

The encyclical letter Mediator Dei is primarily important for its affirmation of the Liturgical Movement and its efforts to involve the faithful in the sacred liturgy. Those who still recited the rosary during Mass, or based their spirituality more on devotions than the liturgy, were informed that liturgical renewal was the program of the church. The letter reaffirms what Pius X said about congregational Latin chant. A new emphasis is found, however, in its promotion of congregational vernacular singing. At the fully sung high Mass, everything had to be in Latin (although Germans, Slavs, and Hungarians had a long history of vernacular congregational singing even at high Mass). But at the recited low Mass, congregational vernacular singing was permitted while the priest recited Latin quietly. It is the latter that Pope Pius XII wished to be promoted more strongly.

1955, Musicae Sacrae Disciplina Pope Puis XII

The encyclical letter Musica Sacrae Disciplina is devoted entirely to music. Congregational singing is encouraged, both of Latin chant and vernacular hymns. Considering that Latin chant is integral to the liturgy, but vernacular hymns are not found in the official liturgical books and are a sort of "addon" to the liturgy, it is fascinating to see that Pope Pius XII writes much more about vernacular hymns than Gregorian chant. This is surely because many had discovered by 1955 that it is rather difficult to stimulate congregational singing in Latin. The document says that use of vernacular at high Mass requires the special permission of the Holy See, which refers to the exception granted to Germanspeaking lands in 1943 at the pleading of their bishops. The pope also encourages music in a wide variety of styles; stringed instruments (which had been forbidden by Pius X) are now permitted in the liturgy.



CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Importance of Purpose

The readings today are all about being chosen and sent by God. St. Paul reminds us that God has sent each of us for a purpose.

It is up to us to determine what that purpose is and how we can best make use of it during our lifetimes. Each of us is driven by something.

Keeping the ultimate goal in life as eternal life, it is a wise person who pays attention to the "inner voice" and signs in life that lead us to fulfill the purpose(s) that God has in mind for us.

Many of us have read *The Purpose Driven Life* by Rick Warren and know what a wealth of wisdom it contains. The readings this week lend themselves to some excerpts from this book, such as the following:

- Many people are driven by guilt.
- Many people are driven by resentment and anger.
- 3. Many people are driven by fear.
- 4. Many people are driven by materialism.
- Many people are driven by the need for approval.

The driving forces listed above make no mention of God. It is important to remember in this busy world and lives we lead that:

Nothing matters more than knowing God's purposes for your life, and nothing can compensate for not knowing them.

There are five great benefits of living a purpose-driven life.

- 1. Knowing your purpose gives meaning to your life.
- 2. Knowing your purpose simplifies your life.
- 3. Knowing your purpose focuses your life.
- 4. Knowing your purpose motivates your life.
- Knowing your purpose prepares you for eternity.

Living to create an earthly legacy is a short-sighted goal. A wiser use of time is to build an eternal legacy.

One of the questions we anticipate when this life is over is "What did you do with what I gave you?"



What did you do with your life—all of the gifts, talents, opportunities, energy, relationships and resources God gave you?

"You, Lord, give perfect peace to those who keep their purpose firm and put their trust in you."

—Isaiah 26-3
