What Ways of Thinking Do We Bring to Our Political Discussions?

As we end this month of October, we are mindful that we have been celebrating and promoting this month as "Respect Life!" As Catholics, we are a people who believe in life and the promotion and protection of life from womb to tomb.

We have two major political parties in our country—the Republicans and the Democrats—and both parties are courting the Catholic vote. Sadly, but in truth, we must admit that neither party is pro-life as the Catholic Church is pro-life. We see pro-life stances in both political parties, but we also see anti pro-life choices in both parties. Neither of the major political parties reflects the pro-life stance of the Catholic Church.

Yet, as Catholics, we must exercise our responsibilities and duties as citizens of this country. We must take the values of the Catholic Church, and through our informed consciences, vote for the candidates and positions that best reflect a consistent pro-life ethic. This becomes an issue of conscience and not political party affiliation.

I share with you these "10 Questions for the Campaign" that came to us from the Administrative Committee of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in their statement, "The Challenge of Faithful Citizenship—A Catholic Call to Political Responsibility." Although these questions were created over ten years ago, they are still very relevant as we think through our political positions, choose political candidates, and make our choices based on informed Catholic Teaching and the use of our conscience.

- 1. After September 11, how can we build not only a safer world, but a better world—more just, more secure, more peaceful, more respectful of human life and dignity?
- 2. How will we protect the weakest in our midst—innocent unborn children? How can our nation not turn to violence to solve some of its most difficult problems—abortion to

deal with difficult pregnancies; the death penalty to combat crime: euthanasia and assisted suicide to deal with the burdens of age, illness, and disability; and war to address international disputes?

- 3. How will we address the tragic fact that more than 30,000 children die every day as a result of hunger, international debt, and lack of development around the world?
- 4. How can our nation help parents raise their children with respect for life, sound moral values, a sense of hope, and an ethic of stewardship and responsibility? How can our society defend the central institution of marriage and better support families in their moral responsibilities?
- 5. How will we address the growing number of people without affordable and accessible health care? How can health care better protect human life and respect human dignity?
- 6. How will our society combat continuing prejudice, overcome hostility toward immigrants and refugees, and heal the wounds of racism, religious bigotry, and discrimination?
- 7. How will our nation pursue the values of justice and peace in a world where injustice is common, desperate poverty widespread, and peace too often overwhelmed by violence?
- What are the responsibilities and limitations of families, community organizations, markets, and government? How can these elements of society work together to overcome poverty, pursue the common good, and care for creation?
- When should our nation use, or avoid the use of military force—for what purpose, under what authority, and at what human cost?
- 10. How can we join with other nations to lead the world to greater respect for human life and dignity, religious freedom and democracy, economic justice, and care for God's creation?

None of these questions are easy to answer! Pray. Spend time and energy in creating an informed conscience that will influence your political thinking...

November brings the year of grace to its fulfillment. (And in 2013, the month itself is full: Advent does not begin until November's ultimate hour, sunset on Saturday the 30th.) The twin festivals of All Saints and All Souls usher in the month. Together with the Sunday readings from Luke's Gospel, they center us in Jerusalem.

The stunning and compelling vision of a New Jerusalem in the Book of Revelation—from which comes the first reading for All Saints Day, the very first scripture proclaimed in the month—is November's leitmotif and life's goal. It is for this that we set out back on January 27, when we opened the Gospel of Luke at its beginning. We began Ordinary Time back then hearing Jesus proclaim, "Today this scripture is being fulfilled in your midst!"

All Saints Day was born of Easter in the fourth century. Many Eastern churches still keep it on the Sunday after Pentecost; the Syrian liturgy, on the Friday of Easter Week. In the churches of the West, it migrated to November 1 in the middle of the eighth century, ostensibly to baptize old Celtic practices of feasting the dead. Now it lays open for us the deep meaning of November: that it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. The saints are the community of those dressed in baptism's robes, robes washed white in the blood of the Lamb. The Lamb is both temple and lamp at the center of the New Jerusalem. "Its gates will never be shut by day, and there will be no night there" (Rev 21:25). To enter those gates, open to all, to find that eternal day, promised to all, we must pass as a community through the many Jerusalems of this world.

So November's first Sunday, November 3, tells of Zacchaeus, and the words of Jesus give the liturgies of November their power: "Today salvation has come into house!" (Think of the church's house, in which you celebrate the liturgy. Think, too, of the many homes of the Parish.) Zacchaeus descends from the tree to meet and follow him (the beginning of Luke 19), Jesus enters the earthly Jerusalem in triumph (in the middle of Luke 19, which we last read Palm Sunday). He directly challenges the corrupt marriage of organized religion and political oppression by cleansing the temple of the moneychangers (at the end of Luke 19). In the Gospel of November's last Sunday, November 24, the One who called Zacchaeus to come down and confront his own inner life ascends the tree of the cross, having walked the way of tears through Jerusalem out to Golgotha (Luke 23). To get to the New Jerusalem, we pass through the old.

The Gospels of the middle two Sundays are preludes to the Passion. Here, let us bring all the sorrow of the losses we mourned on All Souls Day. On these Sundays, we also read from 2 Thessalonians, concerning the return of Christ at the end of time. Here, let us find the hope born of all that sorrow. Looking back at Christ's passion, looking forward to Christ's return, today—in these liturgies of November—salvation comes to this house! We continue to read from 2 Thessalonians on the last Sunday of November, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Despite this which sounds title, almost comicbook-like to modern ears, the reign of Christ over, in, and throughout all creation is what the liturgical year is all about: "Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end. ... All times belong to Christ, and all the ages, to whom be glory and power through every age

and for ever. Amen," we sang on Easter's Eve.

As you celebrate the liturgies of November, then, hold the saints and souls in your heart, and keep Jerusalem, new and old, before your eyes.



Let's embrace the wisdom born of years and experiences and not a few failures. May we come to appreciate a cooler head and tougher heart, slower impulses and faster second thoughts.

And yes, let the demons of year's end come and we'll host

them; pouring tea while they speak their names and remind us of what we did and failed to do. The past is past, and ghosts of shame and regret can't scare us as they once did. Trick or Treat Stewardship

On October 31, little goblins and princesses descend upon our doorsteps seeking treats and goodies. If we think about it, our relationship with God is sometimes like that Halloween tradition. We, like children on Halloween, eagerly come to God's doorstep when we want something.

We come to God for blessings, requests of help for ourselves or someone else, for strength in times of trouble, and, most importantly, for the gift of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist at Mass. All of these are available to us if we but knock at God's door. Are we to be like children who continually ask for more without ever thinking about God's will for us and the gifts he gives us?

If our relationship with God is based solely on our asking and God giving, we are like the neighborhood children coming to our door for candy. There is no relationship. God is always at the door waiting for us to knock. He wants to give us love, joy, faith, and blessings. God is like the neighbor who does not give just one candy bar per child but who dumps a whole handful of candy into each bag.

However, unlike candy on Halloween, God's gifts come with a purpose and responsibility. God does not give us His gifts just to keep to ourselves. He gives them to us to be shared, and shared abundantly, with others. With love and generosity the gifts are given so with love and generosity they are to be shared.



Everything we have, including our time and talents, are gifts from God. They are given and meant to be shared. As recipients of God's gifts, we are not to use them solely for our own benefit, but use them for the benefit of others, as Jesus instructed us.

As we stand at the doorstep of God to receive God's gifts, we must receive them graciously, cultivate them responsibly, share them with others in love and justice, and return a fitting portion back to God in gratitude. If we do this, we are no longer just neighborhood children knocking on God's door, but truly His sons and daughters.


